Re: Community Cohort Evaluation Tool – FY2025 updates

Community cohorts

In 2015, CMAP implemented a policy¹ to require a program contribution for planning assistance through the technical assistance program. To determine the amount of program contribution that a benefiting area should provide, CMAP established the Community Cohort Evaluation Tool². The data used by the tool is updated annually. In prior years, the tool used the data and factors of population, median household income, tax base per capita, and the percentage of the population located in a disinvested area or in an economically disconnected area. In response to new federal guidance, the tool has been revised and does not use the population percentage in an economically disconnected area for the FY2025 update.

FY2025 cohorts

Community Cohorts are assigned based on the three-year rolling average of the annual overall scores to limit the amount of year-to-year fluctuation for communities whose overall scores are close to one of the cohort thresholds. The scores from this FY2025 run were then averaged with the annual overall scores from FY2024 and FY2023, as published in those respective years. The result of the three-year rolling average of annual overall scores determined the FY2025 cohorts. A list of communities in each cohort is attached and will be published on the CMAP website. A summary of the total number of communities in each of the FY2025 cohorts are as follows:

Cohort changes

Municipality trends

Nineteen municipalities' cohorts changed from FY2024 to FY2025. The update resulted in two municipalities moving into a new category of moderate, low, and very low need (cohorts 1 and 2) and eight municipalities moving into the high and very high need category (cohorts 3 and 4). The changes in municipal cohorts were primarily due to the methodology change described above, and were also influenced by updates to the population, tax base per capita, and median household income scores. The municipal cohort changes are as follows:

Chicago community area trends
